WALK WITH JESUS - HE BREAKS BARRIERS



Luke 17:11-19 On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

Stories of Jesus' care for the marginalized and his crossing of social boundaries to associate with outcasts fill the Gospels. It is at the margins of society where unwelcome outsiders and handicapped individuals are often stigmatized, rejected, and forgotten. The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem offers healing and grace to all – no matter their religion, ethnicity, or economic status. The Diocese offers love for neighbor by showing mercy to all. Jesus clearly notices the needs of people on the margins, loves them, and calls us to do the same.

The Diocese of Jerusalem bears witness to the power of Jesus' love through its ministries that serve people with disabilities. Many children with disabilities in the region served by the Diocese are isolated and excluded from society and their communities. They are often unable to learn, socialize, play, and enjoy life. Their right to proper care, adequate nutrition, quality health services, and education are frequently denied or deemed a low priority. The most significant barrier in the Middle East to rehabilitation and inclusion of children and young people with disabilities are negative attitudes and stereotypes. Stigma associated with disabilities can move families and communities to keep these children hidden, cutting them off from vital rehabilitation and education services. The sad fact is that in this region, education typically is not inclusive or accessible, so children with disabilities often cannot go to school and learn alongside their peers without disabilities. Parents and caregivers do not receive education and support to raise their children. And children with disabilities do not all have access to rehabilitation services and therapy, including psychosocial support, that they need to live productive lives.

The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre (JPBC) located on East Jerusalem's Mount of Olives, operates under the umbrella of the Arab Anglican Episcopal Church in

Jerusalem and the Middle East, and under the supervision of the Archbishop. It works in the fields of inclusive education, health, and disability.

JPBC implements long-term community-based programs and maintains a vision of providing comprehensive rehabilitation and inclusive education through the Child Rehabilitation Centre and the Inclusive School.

Through Child Rehabilitation Centre, JPBC provides treatment and rehabilitation for Palestinian children with disabilities from the West Bank, Gaza Strip, and Jerusalem, for the age group 0-15. The Inclusive School is a unique model of inclusive education serving children with disabilities from Jerusalem in Kindergarten up to 12th grade.

The **Holy Land Institute for the Deaf** is a non-profit foundation located in Salt, Jordan, north of Amman, that provides educational and rehabilitation services for people with hearing impairment. The facility serves approximately 150 male and female students, mostly Jordanian, from the ages of 3 to 20. The institute provides audiology service and hearing aids, and the outreach program does hearing tests for children in refugee camps. The Salt Training and Resource Institute for Disability program carries out teacher training in the Middle East.

Students at the institute are taught Jordanian Sign Language plus typical subjects taught in most schools. Students must also learn a vocational trade. For boys this can be auto mechanics, carpentry, painting, auto bodywork, and metalwork. Girls study homemaking skills: weaving, machine knitting, sewing, and childcare. Both boys and girls study computer skills, printing, ceramics, and earmold manufacturing. Ear molds for hearing aids are made on site.

Saviour Arab Evangelical School in Zarka, Jordan is a co-ed K-12 school serving more than 300 students in the industrial city of Zarka. It offers one of the city's only programs for low-vision and blind students. Saviour is the sole option in this region for families who want an inclusive, academic education for their vision-impaired children.

This is the 5th in a series of 6 articles about the work of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and its ministries in the Middle East. The information was developed by the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and published as a 5-part course called "Bearing Witness" on their website in 2023. We offered this course online during Lent this past spring and will offer it in person this fall at St. Peter's during our Wonderful Wednesday series. The dates are October 9 and 23 and 30, November 13, and December 11 at 5:30 PM.
